- 5°, The Scottish and Irish Airs with Variations, at the end of these Volumes, which are intended as useful exercises for Scholars, are an addition to be found in no other Selection.
- 6°, The Poetry being reduced to a regular measure, the necessity of adding or retreaching notes (a practice highly injurious to the Airs), is obviated.

FINALLY, a complete Glossary has been joined to each Volume. In some Selections this necessary appendage is entirely omitted, and in others there is only one for several Volumes; an inconvenience much felt in England and Ineland.

This Work has been honoured by the flattering commendations of Mr Viotti, the admirable Performer on the Violin (a gentleman as highly estimable for his private character as for his transcendent talents); Dr Beckwith of Norwich; Mr Pratt, Organist of the King's Chapel, Cambridge; Drs Hague and Clarke, of the University there, (well-known Authors of interesting publications); the ingenious and immortal Author of the "General History of Music," Dr Burney, &c. &c. &c. In short, few Works of this kind ever experienced a greater support from Professors at large, or from the most eminent Music-scilers in Great Britain; a success extremely grateful to my feelings, as I am conscious of having used my utmost endeavours to render this Selection worthy the attention of the proper judges of the art.
